

“I wouldn’t mind turning into a vermillion goldfish.” - Henri Matisse

Henri Matisse was born in northern France on December 31st, 1869. He studied law in Paris but was unhappy in his career choice. At the age of 21, Matisse became ill with appendicitis. To ease his boredom while recovering from surgery, his mother gave him painting supplies. He later said, “From the moment I held the box of colors in my hands, I knew this was my life.”

Matisse returned to Paris to study art. He drew inspiration from other artists such as Cezanne and van Gogh. He admired their use of bold color and brushwork and mimicked these techniques in his own paintings.



He traveled extensively but his trips to Morocco seemed to have the greatest impact on his art. He admired the peaceful and relaxed Moroccan lifestyle, noting how the locals could spend the day gazing into goldfish bowls. Matisse wanted his art to be "a soothing, calming influence on the mind, rather like a good armchair." At least nine of Matisse’s paintings depict goldfish.

Did you know?

Art critics were appalled by Matisse’s bold use of color and visible brushstrokes, referring to him and his artist friends as “fauves”, or “wild beasts”. But Matisse and his fellow “fauves” adopted the name proudly and continued painting.

In his later years Matisse preferred using cut outs from large, painted pieces of paper to make his art. He called this method “drawing with scissors”. He enjoyed this technique as it allowed him to move the shapes around the canvas to achieve the perfect balance.

For the month of October, students will create a paper cut out collage inspired by Matisse’s *Beasts of the Sea* and his painting titled *Goldfish*.
